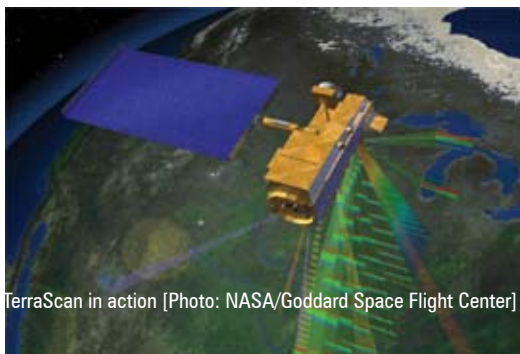
IS OUR GENIUS BITING US BACK?

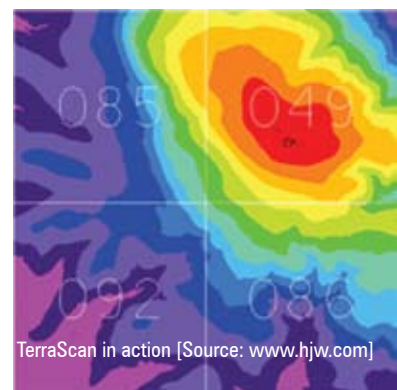
